About the Examination



- ✓ In the Northern hemisphere the students sit for the same exams on the same day of May.
- Exam scripts are sent to examiners in IB schools world wide
- ✓ Background for the students' evaluations in all subject is given by several components: internally assessed submissions -20/30 % and exam papers (+externally assessed submissions i some subjects) -80/70 %
- ✓ The grade range is 1 7
- ✓ No exam in May for Visual Arts
- ✓ The internally assessed components are assessed by the teachers and "moderated" by an IB examiner.
- ✓ All evaluation is based on criteria
- ✓ Evaluation of the core requirements is made according to other criteria.

Examination requirements / Failing conditions



- 1. CAS requirements have not been met.
- 2. Candidate's total points are fewer than 24.
- 3. An N has been given for theory of knowledge, extended essay or for a contributing subject.
- 4. A grade E has been awarded for one or both of theory of knowledge and the extended essay.
- 5. There is a grade 1 awarded in a subject/level.
- 6. Grade 2 has been awarded three or more times (HL or SL).
- 7. Grade 3 or below has been awarded four or more times (HL or SL).
- 8. Candidate has gained fewer than 12 points on HL subjects (for candidates who register for four HL subjects, the three highest grades count).
- 9. Candidate has gained fewer than 9 points on SL subjects (candidates who register for two SL subjects must gain at least 5 points at SL).



Remember that



- ✓ A minimum of 3 in all 6 IB Subjects
- ✓ A minimum 20 IB points
- ✓ A minimum of D in TOK and EE
- ✓ CAS Programme completed



- ❖ The DP is a two year programme that aims to foster acquisition and development of different skills. These skills are formatively assessed during the two years and summatively assessed through the examination tasks of the IB Diploma
- The candidates have to work on and deliver some of these tasks before the May session (oral or process-oriented tasks)

The rules on absenteeism



The rules are to be found in the regulations to the Education Act §3-3 last paragraph and the regulations to the Private schools Act §3-3 last paragraph

- ✓ Students in upper secondary school shall attend and participate actively in all planned school activities.
- ✓ If a student has more than 10 percent undocumented absence in a subject this will lead to the loss of a right to a term grade or final/end of year evaluation in that subject. The teacher will be unable to award a grade in that subject.
- ✓ The student must produce relevant documentation to have their absence exempt from this rule
- ✓ If a student has between 10 and 15 percent undocumented absence and the cause of that absence makes it unreasonable that the student should not receive a grade, the Principal may according to the circumstances decide that a grade be awarded. If the undocumented absence exceeds 15 percent in the subject no grade will be awarded.
- ✓ The absenteeism percent is valid for an individual subject, not the student's overall absence.
- ✓ The student shall receive a letter of warning that they are in danger of not gaining a
 grade in the particular subject.

The rules on absenteeism Consequences for IB Students

The rules align with the IB requirement of teaching hours



Regulation:

If a student has more than 10 percent undocumented absence in a subject this will lead to the loss of a right to a term grade or final/end of year evaluation in that subject. The teacher will be unable to award a grade in that subject.

Consequence for IB students

The failure to gain a term grade in one or more subjects will lead to:

- i. The school withholding predicted grades for university application
- ii. As a final resort, any future application to the school's Diploma programme Year 2 (3IB) will reviewed by the school's Admissions committee.



How much is 10% of absence in one subject?

It depends on the subjects

Theory of Knowledge or CAS: two teaching periods (3,5X45 min)

A SL subject: two periods and a half (5X45 min)

A SL/HL subject: four periods and a half (9X45 min)
